# **WELCOME** to the Malteser Church of Saint John the Baptist

As early as 1217, the Knights of St. John, now known as the members of the Order of Malta, operated a chapel on this site (destroyed by fire and rebuilt in 1258) and a hospital, named Commandery St. John of Vienna. The church dates back to the 14<sup>th</sup> century and the fully preserved roof truss is one of the oldest in Vienna. Originally Gothic (the 5/8 choir is still clearly recognisable today), the interior of the church was baroqueised, redesigned in the Empire style in 1806 and given its current façade.



## The Sovereign Order of Malta

- Around 1048: Foundation of a brotherhood for the care and hospitality of pilgrims and the sick in Jerusalem
- 1113: The brotherhood becomes an order St. John the Baptist is its patron saint hence the name "Knights of St. John" (in German language "Johanniter")
- 1309: Rhodes becomes the headquarters of the Order (until 1522)
- 1530: Malta becomes the new headquarters; the name "Order of Malta" becomes common and "Malteser" for its members
- 1565: Victorious defence of Malta from the Ottomans
- 1571: Battle of Lepanto ends the ottoman dominance
- 1798: Napoleon takes over Malta withdrawal of the Order
- 1834: The Order's headquarters are moved to Rome.

#### The Order of Malta today

- Approx. 13,500 members worldwide, approx. 80,000 volunteers and approx. 50,000 full-time staff
- Over 15 million supported people in over 120 countries;
   Diplomatic relations with more than 110 countries and international organisations (UN, EU, etc.).

### Care and relief activities in Austria

- MALTESER Hospitaldienst Austria: voluntary relief corps, social services for the sick and physically disadvantaged, medical services, disaster relief operations
- MALTESER Ordenshaus: modern and best-equipped care home in Vienna for 72 people in the need of 24/7 care
- MALTESER Care: mobile care services (home help, home nursing, 24-hour care, family relief service)
- MALTESER Children's Aid: operates the palliative care home Hilde Umdasch House in Amstetten for children and young people suffering from life-shortening illnesses
- MALTESER Community of St. John: spiritual initiatives to accompany people on their journey of faith
- MALTESER International: support for projects run by the Order of Malta's international refugee and disaster relief organisation


③ <u>Keystone in the cross vault</u>; motif of the lion breathing life into its young = symbol of Christ, who gives people supernatural life

Apsis: Gothic church interior still recognisable; ① over 40 coats of arms of Grand Priors and Commanders; ③ <u>Baroque organ</u>: built in 1767 by the famous organ builder Gottfried Sonnholz; statues of the four evangelists on the parapet

### ® High altar

<u>High altarpiece</u>: by Johann Georg Schmidt in 1730, shows the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan by St. John the Baptist (= patron saint of the Order of Malta). In the background: the island of Malta.

<u>Tabernacle</u>: in the form of an ancient temple, is the place where the Blessed Sacrament is kept.

Above it: <sup>(a)</sup> Icon "Our Lady of Philermos", a highly revered image in the Order of Malta of Holy Mary.

® <u>Statues:</u> Left: St. Paul (was beheaded with the sword in Rome); Right: St. Peter (with the keys of the kingdom of heaven - Mat 16,19)
